The Connecticut Food Bank annually distributes more than 15 million pounds of food to six of the state's eight counties. Donations come from the food industry, through community member and corporate contributions, and via government subsidies.

At the CT Food Bank donations are organized and sorted by products before they are distributed at the warehouses. Member programs send representatives to the warehouses to shop for food that is then distributed to those who need it most at local food pantries, soup kitchens and emergency shelters.

A brief PC Advocacy report from your CT Peace Corps Advocate, Atty. Joan Leonard:

The Peace Corps Day of Action in DC Feb. 27 went off well. As of March 26 a record 145 representatives signed on to Rep. and RPCV Sam Farr's Dear Colleague letter in support of Peace Corps funding. I was hoping for 100% CT delegation support but **neither Jim Himes nor John Larson signed on**. If you are in either man's district tell him of your disappointment and encourage him to join the others in the CT delegation who have pledged their support. If you are in the other 3 districts, thank your congressperson.

Also currently only Rosa De Lauro and Elizabeth Esty are members of the Peace Corps Caucus. Thank them if you are a constituent, if not encourage the others to join. The Caucus is not a funding group - just an educational and support fellowship.

Both of our senators are cosponsors of the Kate Puzey Peace Corps Volunteer Protection Act and support the Peace Corps Equity Act. Thank them and encourage them to press leader Reid to expedite the confirmation vote of Carolyn Hessler-Radelet to be the next Peace Corps Director. She has passed through committee with flying colors and is acting Director but has limited power until she is confirmed and the vote has been hanging fire for months.

I was able to visit every CT senate and house office except Rosa DeLauro's, but she is already a strong supporter. I was well received everywhere, but sometimes the <u>Peace Corps gets loved to death. Our senators and representatives need to not just say nice things about the Peace Corps but to stand up and be counted.</u>

The amount of money we currently spend as a nation in one day is roughly equal to the amount of money our nation has spent on the Peace Corps over its entire 53 year history or put another way the annual **Peace Corps budget is equal to what the military spends on military bands.** Peace Corps funding was increased a little since the sequester but is still not up to the \$400 million we suggest and that is still not up to funding in years past. Currently only one in five Peace Corps applicants is accepted not because of lack of qualifications but because of lack of funding. There are now countries asking for volunteers and programs which have to be turned down because of the funding gap. Sad - when Peace Corps provides so much for so little.

Because of you, a record 151 members of the House of Representatives signed a key letter requesting increased funding for the Peace Corps in the fiscal year that begins next October.

A bi-partisan Senate letter has begun to circulate, thanks to the leadership of Dianne Feinstein (D-CA) and Johnny Isakson (R-GA).

We need you to reach out to your Senators to ask them to sign the Feinstein-Isakson Peace Corps Funding Letter. With an anticipated deadline of April 11th, we urge you to take action now.

We will provide an update on signatures over the coming days, including early next week as part of our April monthly advocacy update.

Hello all!

Just a quick update on photos! We have been working hard with our world map as well as organizing our classroom. Our 9th grader boys have taken over the painting portion of the project, which has been fun to see their motivation and interest grow.

My main counterpart and I have been working hard to organize our past project work, education trainings, and etc. We have a new grading system (e.g. folders for tests to be graded, tested graded and need to be entered into the class journals, and tests to be filed). It's been great thus far and she just said today that she felt much better having things organized as it was a headache before. Georgian teachers sometimes wait until the end of the semester to grade all tests from the semester. Therefore it is a lot of unnecessary stress on the teachers as well as no feedback throughout the semester to the students.

We just ordered our classroom organizer and it should be arriving in a couple of weeks.

Unfortunately, due to the weather (it snowed and has been extremely cold again) and my Peace Corps admin/medical work (I am fine, just a lot of work concerning closing out my service) in Tbilisi, we have been unable to make the progress we were aiming for. Therefore we think we will need another 15 days, basically to finish the project in mid May. However the 9th grader boys as well as others are very interested in doing the next map as we will finish our 1st map in a few more days.

On Tuesday, April 22, Earth Day will be marked around the world with programs and celebrations aimed at increasing local and global environmental action, awareness, information, and social responsibility. I know that many of you will connect with your communities on this special day to focus on environmental awareness and protection. Among Volunteers in the field today, 17 percent are actively engaged in the areas of agriculture and environment, and many more work to promote environmental awareness every day. Whether Volunteers are implementing sustainable agricultural practices, preparing English lessons on environmental issues, solving the problems of solid waste, or finding cleaner ways to cook and prepare meals, I offer a special thanks to them this month for their efforts to preserve our planet and make peace and development possible.

Indeed, it could be said that every day is Earth Day at the Peace Corps. Our Volunteers are engaged in impressive efforts to help their communities preserve and protect the environment. In the past year, Volunteers and counterparts in the Philippines were trained and certified to assess and monitor human impact on coral reefs. In Cameroon,

Volunteers promoted widespread planting and cultivation of the moringa oleifera tree, a fast-growing, drought-resistant species whose seed pods and leaves can be eaten as vegetables. Peace Corps/Jamaica implemented a new partnership with that country's Ministry of Water, Land, Environment, and Climate Change, and leveraged Peace Corps Response Volunteers to successfully complete the ministry's website.

We are also committed to recruiting highly trained Volunteers who can respond to environmental and agricultural needs in a broad array of assignments.
