NEW! Education Small Grants

We are pleased to announce a new small grants program for members and member groups with grants of up to \$500 awarded quarterly to fund community projects/events that promote Peace Corps' Third Goal. This goal is to "strengthen Americans' understanding about the world and its peoples" by way of

returned and current volunteers, as well as friends of the Peace Corps, sharing their Peace Corps experience and host country culture. These grants are intended to educate Americans about other peoples and countries of the world. The project must be short term (less than one month) and of a local scope and scale. Projects will engage with local schools, libraries, and/or community organizations.

"Last September, I trained in the internship at CTV-21 in Newtown, Charter Communications cable community access television with Max Arzu, among others.

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Dear Peace Corps Family:

As you probably know, The New York Times has just published a story on the tragic death of Nick Castle, a Volunteer in China who died in February 2013. As the person whose responsibility it is to notify a fallen Volunteer's family with news that I know will forever change their lives, I can assure you that I experience deep grief with every Volunteer we lose—just as we mourn for every volunteer who is injured or sick while serving in the Peace Corps. The loss of a Volunteer is a tragic event for the entire Peace Corps family—from that person's fellow Volunteers, to their Peace Corps staff, to their host and home communities, to Volunteers and RPCVs across the globe. I want to assure you that as part of our commitment to honor the memory of those we have lost, including Nick, we are dedicated to doing everything we can, every single day, to protect your health, safety and security.

Before I go any further, I want to thank you for your service. I have traveled extensively in the past four years to more than 30 states, and feel so fortunate to have met many of you. I am inspired by your stories of Peace Corps service and the work that you continue to do back home in advancing the Third Goal. You are heroes, every one of you, for you have all chosen to take the

path less traveled to serve in areas of great need—and great potential—and in so doing, you have shown your host communities our country's very best. We all know that we get more than we give through the Peace Corps experience. But you have given, and continue to give, so much. I am inspired by you every day.

But our good work does not come without cost. And it is not news to you that operating in the environments in which we serve can be difficult and poses risks. If it were easy, we wouldn't be there. The vast majority of our Volunteers have safe, healthy, and productive volunteer experiences that they cherish for the rest of their lives. But we have not been immune to tragedy over the years. We are glad that the number of Volunteers who die in service has dropped dramatically since the beginning of Peace Corps. Throughout our history, the number of Volunteers who have died in service is less than two-tenths of one percent. But even one death is too many. Each of our losses is personal—he or she is someone's daughter or son, mother or father, brother or sister, friend or loved one.

We have been working very hard for the past four years to improve the quality of our support to Volunteers, particularly in the areas of health care, safety and security, and programming and training. If you aren't aware of all the things we have done to improve the quality of our support to Volunteers, I encourage you to read about the reforms at peacecorps.gov.

Nothing is more important to the Peace Corps than our Volunteers, and though we can never fully overcome the fundamental challenges of operating abroad, we will never stop pushing the limit to try. We are a vibrant and caring agency. We represent the commitment of nearly a quarter of a million Americans who have served since 1961 and the thousands serving today. The legacy of your compassion and committed service is our strength. We will work through this as we always have, as a family.

Thank you for your service, for your commitment to our mission, and for representing us so well in communities across our nation.
