CTRPCV will sort food ... on Saturday... April 18, 2015

The Connecticut Food Bank annually distributes more than 15 million pounds of food to six of the state's eight counties. Donations come from the food industry, through community member and corporate contributions, and via government subsidies.

At the CT Food Bank donations are organized and sorted by products before they are distributed at the warehouses. Member programs send representatives to the warehouses to shop for food that is then distributed to those who need it most at local food pantries, soup kitchens and emergency shelters.

"Dear Peace Corps Family,

From the very first group of Volunteers, the Peace Corps has embraced diversity. Today, we strive to be inclusive of different races, ethnicities, sexual orientations, ages, and religions. It has long been our goal to ensure that our Volunteer force represents the rich diversity of the United States and guarantee that our host communities fully understand the beautiful multicultural tapestry that is our nation.

We have much to be proud of. For the third year in a row, the Peace Corps holds the number one spot in the "Support for Diversity" category among small federal agencies on the Partnership for Public Service's 2014 Best Places to Work in the Federal Government rankings. The Support for Diversity category measures employees' belief that actions and policies of leadership and management promote and respect diversity. And, our diversity efforts continue to grow.

Over the past year alone, we have seen some of the highest rates of diverse applicants and Volunteers in our history—with 33 percent of Peace Corps applicants and 25 percent of our Volunteers self-identifying as coming from underrepresented racial and ethnic groups. We have hired seven diversity recruiters to reach out into new, underreached communities. In addition, we have expanded the Peace Corps Prep program to include more than 25 universities to better prepare students for service. We have selected 220 campus ambassadors to expand knowledge of the Peace Corps to previously unreached communities on their college campuses. We have also partnered with the Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, the first intercollegiate fraternity established for African-Americans, to help members access Volunteer, higher education, and career opportunities with the Peace Corps.

While much has changed in the United States since our founding, we must work every day to be inclusive, respectful, and open to creating and sustaining an environment that makes this nation great. As a country and as an agency, we still have work to do. Strengthening the cultural fabric of the Peace Corps is more important than ever. It is imperative that we are intentional in our efforts to foster a diverse and inclusive workplace.

As we begin 2015, I challenge us all to be purposeful about diversity and inclusive in our relations with others. While we already have much to show for our efforts, there is still room to grow. It is in the best interest of the Peace Corps, the United States, and the world to make a daily effort to promote open dialogue. As an agency founded on the ideals of peace and friendship across cultures and across nations, we can do no less.
